Clunk-Clunk, Knock-Knock, Now What? By Don Tate

Last fall, I participated in the Central Virginia British Car Club outing to the Blue Ridge Mountains. We drove our Triumph TR250 and it was our first road trip in this car. Departing on a Saturday morning, our first destination was Scottsville, and it was going well until we rolled into town and as I coasted to a stop I heard a 'clunk-clunk' that was definitely related to my decreasing speed. On acceleration, there was no 'clunking'. Hmmm, this is concerning but what is it? We continued on the journey over the mountains and had a wonderful drive. After returning home, I put the car on the lift and got a second

pair of eyes on it. On these Triumphs, you have independent rear suspension which means you have the main driveshaft with ujoints plus more ujoints on each of the



axle half-shafts. Turns out almost all of the nuts had come loose to the point some could be turned without tools! I have since replaced the original lock nuts with new ones.

So I thought my mysterious 'clunk-clunk' was eliminated only to drive the car later and hear a different sound, a 'knock-knock' that seemed to correlate to bumps in the road. Triumphs of this vintage came with lever shocks which require routine tightening but my car was converted to tube shocks by a previous owner. I jacked the car up and removed the rear wheels for an inspection. The shocks seemed tight but I did notice the rubber bushings for the rear suspension were cracked and looking pretty tired. Last summer, at the recommendation of our good friend Gary Kinney, I purchased a set of adjustable trailing arm brackets with the thought of installing them over the winter. Now with the observation of old rubber bushings, I added their replacement to the scope and why not? To install the new brackets, the trailing arms have to come off so what better time to install new bushings.

While waiting for the winter project to begin, I had a conversation with Sandy Thompson of Coventry Motor Works and he got around to talking about the rubber bushings we buy today are obviously not

made from the same quality rubber as was used by the factory. In fact, he said they are seeing today's rubber bushings cracking after only 2-3 years. They have switched to urethane by <u>SuperPro</u>, an Australian company. I



have been forewarned about urethane bushings for my Austin Healey because they can be too stiff and provide a hard ride. However, based on his recommendation. I purchased a set for the rear of the Triumph. Another reason is that removing the rear suspension is a lot of wrenching and I prefer not to see cracked rubber bushings in a few years. Time will tell if the investment was a good one. They certainly cost a lot more than rubber. Will the ride be so hard I regret my decision? Stay tuned.

Back to my 'knock-knock'. Steve Terrell, who has done this suspension rebuild a couple of times, offered to help me. In exchange, I am going to assist him with the same project on his TR6. While the tube shock was hanging from the top connection point he checked the shock for any signs of rebound weakness and in the process of pushing and pulling



on the shock, he inadvertently recreated the 'knock-knock'. Whoa, where's that coming from? Well it turns out the bracket that holds the top of the shock is attached to the frame with 2 bolts and they were loose. I was confident this was the sound I was hearing. Another mental note.

We have finished the project and I had a 4-wheel alignment done. On the drive home, both the 'clunk -clunk' and 'knock-knock' are gone and the car handles much better with the new alignment. So far I haven't noticed that the ride quality has changed so fingers crossed!

So now what? As they say, 'every drive is a test drive' and on the way home I noticed I still have 'bump steer' which I was hoping the alignment would correct. However, I



have since learned there's other reasons for bump steer' so I guess that's my 'now what' as well as my 'what's next'.


Evolution of the Triumph Logo Why the Confusion? By Glenn Larson

In perusing the internet these days for information about our classic Triumph cars, one often sees the classic Triumph under swoop logo for Triumph motorcycles used mistakenly in conjunction with clas-

sic Triumph cars from the 1950s, 60s and 70s. As owners of these sports cars, we know the swoop doesn't appear any-

where on our cars, but the online sellers of ancillary merchandise and add-ons supposedly marketed for TRs, Spitfires and other Triumph marques seem to think otherwise. Why the confusion?

The answer goes back to origins of the Triumph Motor Company, established as the Triumph Cycle Company in 1889 in Coventry, England. Originally



building bicycles, Triumph branched out into motorcycle manufacturing in the early 1900s and then automobiles in 1923. The Triumph Motor Company made both motorcycles and cars until the company split into



two separate corporations in 1936.

Between 1923 and 1936, Triumph cars and motor-cycles shared the same under swoop logo. While



extremely rare here in the US, pre WWII Triumph cars enjoy an enthusiastic following in the UK. Find out more about pre WWII Triumphs at the Pre-1940 Triumph Motor Club website.

In the early 1930s, Triumph started

using the "Triumph All Over the World" motto and incorporated a globe into their badging. After the 1936 sale, most pre WWII Triumph cars had adopted the Triumph world badge, variations

of which were widely used for the Triumph marque in the late 1940s and 1950s, including the TR3.

Today, because of the popularity of modern Triumph motorcycles, many associate our cars with the Triumph motorcycle under swoop logo, even those new to our hobby who purchase Triumph swoop merchandise for their cars. If you see one, take the opportunity to explain that the Triumph



logos' common history does not realistically translate to a swoop decal on a Spitfire.
