After the business meeting, both Dean Tetterton and I will present an interesting discussion about electrolysis and how it finds the most suitable grounding path. I recently attended a tech session about stray voltage in the car's cooling system that is caused by poorly grounded components, alternator overcharging and static electricity looking for a ground. We will demonstrate a test using a digital volt meter that will make for interesting results about the quality of the coolant. Time permitting, we will test one of our cars and a member's car.

British V-8 Gathering Wytheville, VA June 12 to 15th By Gary Kinney

Once a year, there is a unique gathering of British cars with very highperformance engine packages featuring a V-8 motor. Most are MGBs with a mix of Austin Healey, Jaguar, Sunbeam, Triumph and other models. There



is no car show other than the incredible view in the parking lot and in itself, a sight to see.

This year, 52 cars met for the second time in Wytheville, VA for three days of technology, comradery and most of all driving. The driving events were primarily country back roads through the hills and high elevations of Southwest Virginia, West Virginia and

North Carolina. Destinations included a stop at Big Walker Mountain Lookout, VA on our way to Princeton, WV to tour the historic Princeton **Railroad Museums** and Dr. Michael Crew's incredible car collection. After leaving Princeton, a bunch of us headed 35 miles south to Tazwell, VA, stopping at the visitors center before a drive on the "Back of the Dragon" run. Thirty-two miles, 386 turns and elevations to 3,500 ft, a challenge for your driving skills. The "Dragon" dumped us

at the other end near Marion, VA where we headed northeast back to Wytheville, probably 170 miles of serious driving that day. We even made the <u>evening</u> <u>news</u> in Princeton, WV.

On the next day, there were two very informative tech sessions about stray electrolysis (something I need to do research about) and maybe give a tech session. Another popular tech session was about improving ignition performance with high performance V-8's. Later we toured around the Wytheville Tourism Bureau and the recently acquired Great Lakes of Florida Museum building. Lunch followed at a beautiful park in town (our mid-day stop) and meeting the mayor of Wytheville. The afternoon tech session at the Thomas J Boyd Museum was hosted by Jim Blackwell, an incredible engineering mind who built a mechanical device to replicate engine timing and use of an ECM on a British car with a V-8. Fascinating but, unfortunately, I was unable to take a decent picture of this device.

On Wednesday morning, we headed south into N. Carolina for a tech session at Trilogy Detailing near Sparta, NC, then lunch and a tour of a performance shop in Roaring Gap, NC. Then we returned to Wytheville, driving only a short 105 miles that day. In the evening, we gathered for a banquet and fun auction which all of us donated some worthy items to seed next year's conference to be held in Arkansas. Wrapping it up, I drove home Sunday morning June 12 to the afternoon of June 16th. The TR8 rolled 850 miles flawlessly with a newly installed electric power steering kit. The TR8 and I were happy to be back home after some serious driving.

TR6 Seat Diaphragm Alternative By Jeff Boyea

The replacement seat diaphragms on both my 1973

TR6 seats had deteriorated and ripped after being in storage for 20 years. I ordered 2 replacements, installed them and one of the rubber tabs on each seat ripped during the installation. After sitting for a week 2 more tabs ripped on each seat. Most of the parts vendors I looked at sold the same style with the tabs based on pictures on their respective websites. So I



looked for an alternative and found rubber upholstery webbing that is used for support in many seats. The webbing must be a low stretch type which I believe is identified by 1 red stripe in the middle and two inches wide. You will need 12 feet of



webbing and 20 metal end clips for rubber upholstery webbing (make sure to get the clips with a hole in the center). I also used some black upholstery dust cover fabric between the foam and the webbing.

I was able to find all the materials on Amazon for under \$40. I reused the hooks from the old diaphragm. For each seat, I cut 3 - 12 % inch long

webbing for the side to side webbing and 2 - 13 ³⁄4 inch long webbing for the front to back webbing. I installed the metal clips using pliers, making sure the webbing is fully inserted in the clips and crimped very tightly. To install each strap, I used a flat screwdriver or small pry bar to push the 2nd hook into the hole in the seat. It took a good



amount of force to stretch them which is good for a firm seat bottom. I wove the webbing straps as they were installed.

I have enough webbing and dust cover fabric to do four more seats if anyone is interested. Hopefully this will last a good number of years without sagging Time will tell.




ble. These kits currently retail for around \$100. I picked this one up for

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More on Nuts and Bolts By Glenn Larson



"New" Triumph Bumper Option?

RTR member Jim Barker emailed me recently about the new bumpers he purchased for his 1969 TR6.

Glenn, saw this on Facebook this morning. I did go to their website and found they have quite a gallery of bumpers. Whether it is a scam is another question. I bought a set of stainless steel bumpers off of eBay and am very satisfied with them. My order was shipped from Vietnam. This may be the same group.



I replied:

I think so, Jim. The "Vietnam bumpers," as I've seen them called on Facebook and other sites, get good reviews. I think they all are from the same company, <u>bumperautomobile.com</u>. It's probable the ones you bought from eBay are from the same folks.

Looks like the company, Bumperautomobile, manufactures a wide variety stainless steel bumpers for classic cars, including Triumphs, MGs, and other classic European marques. It lists bumpers available for TR4s, TR250s, TR6s and Spitfires. No endorsement implied, but it may be worth checking out if you are interested in replacing your bumpers.



Caveat Emptor! The front strut insulator pads on my 1973 Stag were almost 50 years old, so I purchased rubber ones from a well known supplier. When they arrived from the UK, they obviously didn't fit (right). The poly ones I subsequently bought (left) did. Why the discrepancy, and where was quality control?
