

RTR Makes Impressive Showing at VTR 2022 By Stephen Oertwig

Triumph enthusiasts from across North America gathered Aug. 28 through Sept. 1 in Galena, Illinois, for the annual Vintage Triumph Register convention and North America Triumph Challenge. VTR 2022 was sponsored by the Illinois Sports Owners Association, a VTR chapter based in the Chicago area.

VTR 2022 was deja vu of the originally scheduled VTR 2020 convention that was canceled because of the COVID pandemic. ISOA brought the convention back to life for 2022 at the original venue, the Eagle Ridge Resort & Spa. Galena is a jolting landscape compared to the flat cornfields of Indiana and Illinois. Galena featured mountainous driving conditions and many twisting driving roads. While Galena is only a few miles away from Iowa and Wisconsin, it seemed to be a world of its own with so many hills.

The Middle Atlantic region was represented well at this year's convention, which was the first convention east of the Mississippi River since 2018 when it was held in Lacrosse, Wisconsin. I was joined at VTR 2022 by Gary Kinney with a TR8 coupé; Jack and

Carol Schmelyun with a TR-2 and Gary Klein in a TR8 convertible from Triumphs Around the Chesapeake; and Melody Laurel with a Spitfire and Bob De Lucia from the Delaware Valley Triumphs. VTR 2022 was the third convention in a row where Gary and I represented Richmond Triumph Register.

About 300 people with 200 Triumphs attended VTR 2022. VTR conventions draw many side curtain Triumphs as well as TR4s and TR6s. The Triumph Wedge Owners Association, a subchapter of VTR, always has its members out in force with many TR7s and TR8s. Spitfires of all years were plentiful. There also was a Renown limousine. Only three Stags were at VTR 2022, but the highlight of the herd was Stag No. 2, which Triumph used as a mule and for adver-



tising photography for U.S. sales.

Besides my Herald 1200 estate, there were three other Heralds, a Sports 6 and a Vitesse. A rarity this year was the gathering of three estates: my Herald, a 2500 PI estate and a 10 estate making its first appearance after restoration. The estates made it an Estatefest.

VTR 2022 had a wheel-clutching welcome. The blue skies of Illinois' tabletop landscape turned dark with heavy rain interrupted by tornado warnings. Some of the East Coast contingent reported driving through hail.

A highlight side trip of the 975-mile drive was a stop in Triumph, Illinois. I had spotted Triumph on the map off of Interstate 39 on the last day of the three-day drive. The best sign for Triumph for a picture was at the post office. Triumph is best known

for its curling club. Turns out Triumph also was the location for a checkpoint during the rallye held at the first North America Triumph Challenge in 1975. It was very popular for VTR members heading east after the convention for a photo op.

The first couple days of VTR conventions are times to see old friends and slowly gauge the momentum of the venue. The funkhana was on day two. This event needs a passenger. Since Ho Yong stayed home to care for the two big dogs, I had asked Bob De Lucia to be the left seater (the Herald is right-hand drive). Just as I was lining up for the

funkhana, Sondra Brasfield of the Kansas City Triumphs asked if she could be my left-hand navigator. I used to be a member of the KC Triumphs, so it was a great chance to see some Midwest friends. This was to my advantage because Sondra had done the funkhana already with her husband.

Despite the advantage, we did not win, but had a jolly good time. The right-hand drive Herald gave the course workers fits.

ISOA went all out for the welcome party that night. Matt Krajniak, VTR 2022 convention chair, had the host hotel provide a feast for attendees. I had been preparing for this event since 2020. I had bought a Union Jack suit two years ago just for the welcome party. It did dazzle many people when I walked into the crowd with the Union Jack competing with the setting sun.

Day Three started out with the traditional breakfast run in downtown Galena. Gary was at the front of the line of Triumphs cueing up for the second wave to Galena. Since Gary was without a route navigator, he asked someone else to take the lead. What should have been a 10-minute drive turned into a 40-minute adventure because of the circuitous roads around Galena. Galena is the birthplace of Ulysses Grant, and the town made sure you knew it.

ISOA changed the game with the normal gimmick



rallye, probably to reduce the number of people to work the course. Drivers encountered a poker run where a card is drawn for best hand. Vanguard was my navigator for this run, but we only drew three sixes, which I thought was good. The winning hand was four-of-a-kind, kings high. There also was a time-speed-distance rallye that required drivers to use app-based software to mark checkpoints.

Burning rubber and squealing tires were the focus for day four. Unlike the course at the 2021 convention in Edmond, Oklahoma, that featured a wideopen field, the autocross course at Galena was tight and short. It favored Spitfires and other Heraldbased cars to maneuver the hairpin turns.

I was able to shave three seconds off each pass for the three runs allowed. The Herald's Solex carburetor choked on the tight turns, but kept its wheels on the ground to successfully defend its title as the



Fastest Herald in VTR and Class SH champion two years in a row. Climax of VTR 2022 was the Triumph car show in Galena. Cars were displayed on a grassy park near the historic downtown of Galena, and drew many spectators. VTR fields two divisions: participants' choice and Concours d'Elegance.

Only the estate and another Herald were on display for participants' choice because of personal commitments by the other two Heralds. I spent the day photographing cars and talking with VTR members. I thought I had a low VTR number with 231, but found out Terry Telke, whom has the Renown, has VTR membership number of six. He is one of the founding members from Detroit in 1974.

VTR's membership meeting was held after the show. I brought up about making VTR's magazine an email feed because of increased printing and postage costs. The board agreed to look at this.

Conventions always have various technical sessions. Sessions included LED lighting, brakes and handling, and Stromberg and SU carburetors.

Highlight of the convention was the awards banquet on the final night. The guest speaker was Tim Suddard, publisher of Classic Motorsports Magazine and Grassroots Motorsports Magazine. He weaved a story about how Triumphs changed his life.

I learned he bought the rights to British Car, which I had subscribed to for many years. When I cleaned out the house to sell, I threw away many issues of British Car with much regret.

When it came time for car show awards, I was happy to have just been at the convention. Gary won best in class for TR8s in participants' choice. He had the only TR8 coupé among the Wedge convertibles and made a stunning presentation. I also won best in my class for special interest with the Herald. I had all the books and manuals out for people to thumb through, and that does make a difference in
